Let us introduce you to the Day Camp Staff...

If you have any questions or concerns about Day Camp during your week of service, the Day Camp Director is your go to person. Under his/her leadership are the wonderful **counselors**, with whom you will be paired. They are your direct authority during the week. There will also be members of Canyonview's **Teens In Ministry** (T.I.M.) Program at Day Camp. Their role will be similar to yours at Day Camp. Many T.I.M.s have experience at Day Camp, and they should be able to answer any questions you have.

You get the amazing opportunity to serve God by serving campers at Canyonview's Day Camp. There is a great deal of responsibility that comes with this. You are encouraged to ask questions and learn about the ministry. To help, here are a few things that you must know.

As a JC you...

- ~ Model good camp behavior at all times!
- ~ Are responsible for the health and safety of each camper in your group.
- ~See campers on and off the bus in the morning and afternoon.
- ~ Know at all times where each camper is. (Doing head counts is not a bad idea.)
- ~ Are particularly watchful at swim and creek-walking times.
- ~ Make sure that campers are safely returned to parents back at the church.
- ~ Are responsible to nurture the spiritual health of your campers.

Bring your Bible, initiate conversation with kids, share your excitement with them about Christ's love, lead by example, and most importantly...love them!

DAY CAMP DIRECTOR'S EXPECTATIONS FOR YOU AT DAY CAMP

The First Day you meet your campers...

Before you get on the bus, you might have the opportunity to hang out with your group. Don't miss the ministry available.

<u>Top of the Hill (am):</u> When the campers arrive at camp, have them line up with their counselor.

<u>Flagpole:</u> At the flagpole, keep the kids in line; keep them straight and quiet.

<u>Activity:</u> At activity time, keep the kids under control and only participate in the activity if the leading counselor offers it to you. This time is for the kids to do the activities not us. Almost always you will be able to participate in the activity, but your priority is the campers.

<u>Large Group:</u> In large group, sit with the kids. If you have a question, ask the counselor at flagpole or at the top of the hill. Sit amongst the kids, so you can keep them quiet and focused.

<u>Lunch:</u> At lunch engage in conversation with the kids about themselves. This is a great time to learn what you can pray about for the kids.

<u>Changing:</u> During changing time, help the kids to move quickly and line up quickly. Remind them that for every minute they spend in the changing room they lose swim time. <u>Remember, two staff need to be</u> in the changing rooms any time a camper is changing.

<u>Swim Time:</u> At swim time, plan on helping at the counselor's station. If the counselor releases you to have free time, try to hang out with at least one of your campers. When you are swimming, follow all the rules.

<u>Small Group Time:</u> In small group, help keep the campers keep quiet while the counselor teaches. If you have personal questions, save them for afterwards. Again, this is the time for the campers to learn from us—if we are having our own discussions, they may tune out.

<u>Top of the Hill (pm):</u> At the end of the day, get the kids up the hill and on the correct bus. Their parents will appreciate their kids returning home safely.

<u>Group Games:</u> Assist the counselors, be boundaries, participate in some way.

<u>Counselor Hunt:</u> Lead the kids around looking for counselors. Don't cheat. Let the kids pick where to look no matter how foolish their ideas appear. It's about them.

<u>Tour:</u> During the tour, listen to the counselor so that the kids have a good model to follow. Start to learn their names, get to know them, and answer their questions.

<u>Family Night:</u> During family night, mingle with the families. Do your best to greet each kid's parents and eat with at least three families.

COUNSELOR ROLE

Supreme Ruler of the camper group.

YOUR ROLE

Second in command to the Supreme Ruler of the camper group. Take authority of the group in submission to your counselor.

COUNSELOR RESPONSIBILITY TO YOU

- Help you have a successful week of ministry.
- Point out areas of improvement.
- Give you direction on how to lead.
- Delegate responsibility to you.
- Allow for your participation in small group Bible times.
- Partner with you in ministry, not babysit you.

YOUR RESPONSIBILITY TO THE COUNSELORS

- Submit to the authority of the counselor that you are directly assigned to as well as the other counselors at camp.
- Back up the decisions that they make.
- Work hard to present a unified team to your campers.
- Help wherever and whenever you are asked to.
- Don't be a large camper. Be active in leadership.
- Have a teachable spirit.

PROGRAM AND INTERACTION WITH CAMPERS

Everything that happens at Day Camp is Program! If a camper has a horrible day at camp, then that becomes their program for the day. If they have a great day at camp, then that becomes their program. It is important that we do everything possible to ensure a great program for the campers.

- ~ Know the health concerns in your group!
- ~ **Never** at any time is a JC to administer First Aid. Get a counselor if there is a situation that requires First Aid.
- ~ Is each child in your group having fun?
- ~ Where are your campers developmentally?
- ~ Where are your campers spiritually?
- ~ Be on the alert for campers who might have first day fears, feel excluded, homesick, teased, or bored, or be misbehaving.

INTERACTION WITH CAMPERS: CHILD PROTECTION PLAN

- 1. **RECOGNIZE** appropriate boundaries.
- 2. **RESIST** any inappropriate behavior.
- 3. **REPORT** inappropriate behavior if it does occur.
- 4. **MODESTY-** Everyone's private body parts should be covered at all times around others.
- 5. **NO PRIVATEONE-ON-ONE's** Never be alone with a camper, counselor, staff member where others are not present. Always stay where others can see you.
- 6. **GOOD TOUCH** and **BAD TOUCH** Everyone should always feel safe and encouraged. That is why we love high-fives, and short side hugs. However, hitting, pushing, back rubs, sitting on laps, and touching each other's body parts is uncomfortable and inappropriate.
- 7. **GOOD TALK and BAD TALK** We love to encourage, uplift, be positive, and praise one another. We want to build each other up...all day...every day That's GOOD talk! On the other hand, any bad language, disrespectful attitude, potty humor, or inappropriate jokes is BAD talk and is not tolerated at Canyonview. And, we never tell secrets here at Canyonview. Ever.
- 8. **BULLYING** We have zero-tolerance for any form of bullying. If someone asks you to stop...you must stop! No questions asked. If you ever feel like someone is picking on you or being mean to you, please tell us so we can help you. You will be helping us keep Canyonview fun and safe!
- 9. **Protecting YOUR TERRITORY** Your stuff, your cubby, your body...is yours. At no point, should a counselor or other staff member ever be in your space and make you feel uncomfortable. It's your space!
- 10. **Report** If you ever find yourself involved in or witness uncomfortable behavior here at Canyonview, then we need you to REPORT it and tell somebody quickly. At Canyonview, you can report uncomfortable behavior in one of three ways...
 - 1. First Choice: Tell the Director immediately.
 - 2. Second Choice: If you don't feel comfortable telling the Director, then you can write a note and drop it in the "Safe Box". There is a safe box located at the Ranch, at Oak Lodge and at day camp.
 - 3. If you learn that abuse has happened, you are required to report it to the Director immediately.
- 11. Required- Do not be alone with any other person at any time. You must be in groups of 3 or more.
- 12. **Bathroom and changing rooms** You are not permitted to be in the bathroom or a changing room or anywhere with anyone alone. If you need to take a camper to the bathroom or changing room, then stand in the doorway on the outside of the room or building where everyone can see you and maintain verbal supervision of the camper. Do not permit two campers to be alone either. No people are permitted to be together one on one at any time.
